Travel from Egypt to New York

'Abdu'l-Bahá boarded the RMS Cedric in Alexandria, Egypt, on 25 March 1912, bound for Naples, Italy, arriving 28 March. Shoghi Effendi (age 15) was accompanying 'Abdu'l-Bahá, but was obliged to leave the ship in Naples.

They passed through the Straits of Gibraltar on 3 April.

'Abdu'l-Bahá arrived in New York City on 11 April 1912, returning to Europe on 5 December 1912.

In **New York** 11-25 April 1912, He gave at least one talk a day.

Reporters boarded the ship and found 'Abdu'l-Bahá on the upper deck. He said:

"The pages of swiftly appearing newspapers are indeed the mirror of the world... But it behooveth the editors of the newspaper to be sanctified from the prejudice of egotism and desire, and to be adorned with the ornament of equity and justice."

The major New York newspapers carried headlines:

ABDUL BAHA ABBAS IS HERE TO PREACH BROTHERLY LOVE

PERSIAN TEACHER OF WORLD PEACE IS HERE

ABDUL BAHA HERE TO CONVERT AMERICA TO HIS PEACE DOCTRINE.
