
Return to Europe

'Abdu'l-Bahá returned from America to Europe, arriving in England on 13 December 1912 and staying until 12 June 1913. He visited various communities in the United Kingdom, went to Paris from January to March 1913, then Germany, Budapest, Vienna, and back briefly to Paris before returning to Egypt, where He stayed until nearly the end of the year, going home to Haifa on 5 December 1913.

Crossing the Atlantic Ocean

The crossing of the Atlantic Ocean on the Celtic took eight days. Mostly it was calm, but 'Abdu'l-Bahá said He would like to see a big storm, saying to the Captain "In future people will cross the Atlantic in airships; steamers will only carry freight." This was fifteen years before the first transatlantic flight.



Liverpool, England

When the steamer docked in Liverpool the night of 13 December, Bahá'ís were there to greet Him. He stayed for two days in Liverpool and gave two talks. He first spoke to the Theosophical Society about the purpose of religion.
