Abdu'l-Bahá's Travels to the West

Budapest and Vienna

8-25 April 1913

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Budapest, Hungary

The night of 8 April, 'Abdu'l-Bahá took the train to Budapest, Hungary, where there were no Bahá'ís, changing trains in Vienna. Many important people welcomed Him. He admired the panoramic view of the Danube River, and walked across the Chain Bridge to Buda.

He told his visitors that "*it was his hope that Budapest might become a centre for the reunion of the East and the West, and that from this city the light might emanate to other places.*"

He met with Turkish students, and gave a talk to fifty people at the Theosophical meeting. On 11 April, He spoke in the old Parliament building in Budapest, standing on a high platform directly under two whitewinged angels holding Hungary's coat of arms. A Catholic prelate stood on one side of Him, and a Jewish orientalist on the other, representing the reconciliation of these two great religions. All the seats were occupied, many stood in the gallery and aisles, and even out to the street.

Vienna

On 18 April, 'Abdu'l-Bahá left by train for Vienna, and stayed until 24 April. The afternoon of His arrival, He went to give a talk at the Theosophical Hall, climbing up 120 steps in very cold weather with heavy snow falling. He spoke for two hours, and addressed them two more times while in Vienna. He was visited by Baroness Bertha von Suttner, a novelist, leading figure in the international peace movement, and winner of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1905.
